



• The "Glory" hymn at the end of Matins: DOXASTICON FOR THE SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT IN TONE SIX

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

Thou didst shine forth, O Christ, a Light to those who dwell in the darkness of sin, in the season of abstinence. Show us, therefore, the glorious day of Thy passion, that we may cry to Thee aloud: Arise, O God, and have mercy upon us.

Both now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Most blessed art thou, O Virgin Theotokos, for through Him that was incarnate of thee is Hades despoiled, Adam is recalled from the dead, the curse is made void, Eve is set free, death is slain, and we are endowed with life. Wherefore, in hymns of praise, we cry aloud: Blessed art Thou, O Christ our God, Who is thus well pleased, glory to Thee.

• The Hymns of the Day during the Divine Liturgy of Saint Basil the Great:

THE GREAT LITANY & THE FIRST ANTIPHON:

Through the intercessions of the Theotokos, O Savior, save us. (thrice)

THE LITTLE LITANY & THE SECOND ANTIPHON:

Save us, O Son of God, Who art risen from the dead; who sing to Thee. Alleluia. (thrice) Verse: Glory to the Father... Both now and ever... O, only begotten Son and Word...

APOLYTIKION OF SAINT GEORGE IN TONE FOUR:

Since thou art a liberator and deliverer of the captives, a help and succour of the poor and needy, a healing physician of the sick, a contender and fighter for the kings, O great among martyrs, thou victory-clad George: Intercede with Christ God for the salvation of our souls.

KONTAKIÓN FOR SUNDAYS IN GREAT LENT IN TONE EIGHT:

To thee, the Champion Leader, I thy city ascribe thank offerings of victory, for thou hast delivered me from terrors, O Theotokos; but as thou hast that power which is invincible,

Reader: Brethren, Thou, "O Lord, in the beginning didst lay the foundation of the earth, and the heavens are the works of Thy hands; they will perish; but Thou remainest; and they will all grow old like a garment, and like a mantle Thou wilt roll them up, and they shall be changed; but Thou art the same, and Thy years will not fail." But to which of the angels did He say at any time, "Sit on My right hand, until I make thine enemies a footstool for thy feet?" Are they not all spirits for liturgical ministry, sent forth to minister for the sake of those who are to inherit salvation? Therefore, we ought to give the more earnest heed to the things that were heard, lest at any time we drift away from them. For if the word spoken through angels was confirmed, and every transgression and disobedience received a just retribution, how shall we escape, if we neglect so great a salvation, which having at first been spoken through the Lord, was confirmed to us by those who heard?

Choir: The mouth of the righteous shall meditate wisdom,

THE GOSPEL

The Reading from the Holy Gospel according to Saint Mark. (2:1-12)

At that time, when Jesus returned to Capernaum after some days, it was reported that He was at home. And many were gathered together, so that there was no longer room for them, not even about the door; and He was preaching the Word to them. And they came, bringing to Jesus a paralytic carried by four men. And when they could not get near Jesus because of the crowd, they removed the roof above Him; and when they had made an opening, they let down the pallet on which the paralytic lay. And when Jesus saw their faith, He said to the paralytic, "Son, your sins are forgiven." Now, some of the scribes were sitting there, reasoning in their hearts, "Why does this man speak thus? It is blasphemy! Who can forgive sins but God alone?" And immediately Jesus, perceiving in His spirit that they thus reasoned within themselves, said to them, "Why do you reason thus in your hearts? Which is easier, to say to the paralytic, 'Your sins are forgiven,' or to say, 'Rise, take up your pallet and walk'? But that you may know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins" – He said to the paralytic – "I say to you, rise, take up your pallet and go home." And he rose, and immediately took up the pallet and went out before them all. So that they were all amazed and glorified God, saying, "We never saw anything like this!"

In thee rejoiceth, O full of grace, all creation: the angelic hosts, and the race of men, O hallowed Temple and noetic paradise, glory of Virgins, of whom God was incarnate and became a little child, even our God Who is before all the ages; for He made thy womb a throne, and thy body He made more spacious than the heavens. In thee rejoiceth, O full of grace, all creation; and it glorifieth thee.

Sing the following Hymns in Tone 8:

I have committed against Thee countless sins, and expect unnumbered punishments—the gnashing of teeth, inconsolable weeping, the fire of hell, the darkness and Tartarus. Wherefore, O righteous Judge, grant me tears wherewith I may find forgiveness of sins and delivery from mine iniquities, that fasting, I may cry to Thee, Have compassion on me, O Christ Lord, for Thy rich and Great Mercy.

Seek me, O Word, who am lost in the hills of evil iniquities, who call to Thee, and who for the multitude of my evil traits have been put far away from Thee. Restore me from death to life, and purify me with fasting and constant weeping and crying to Thee, O Christ Lord, Have compassion on me, O Christ Lord, for Thy rich and Great Mercy.

Having begun, O believers, the third week of the Fast, let us praise the venerable Trinity, passing the rest with gladness and joy, emaciating the passions of the flesh. Let us cull from our souls divine flowers, plaiting therewith crowns for the day that is lord of days, that, all being crowned, we may praise Christ as triumphant.

THEN THE ORDINARY KOINONIKON (COMMUNION HYMN):

Praise the Lord from the Heavens. Praise Him in the Highest. Alleluia.

COMMEMORATION: Saint Gregory Palamas, archbishop of Thessalonica; of the holy fathers slain at the monastery of Mar Sabbas; and New-martyr Myron of Crete.

The second Sunday of Great Lent we remember St. Gregory Palamas, Archbishop of Thessalonica. Archbishop Gregory was an enlightened man and a remarkable theologian who had experience of the monastic life on Mount Athos. In his wrightings he defended the Divine Light of Tabor as a visible manifestation of Divine energy, of Divine grace. Why do we remember St. Gregory specifically during Great Lent? Because he reached his penetrating conclusions not on the basis of book learning, but on the basis of real spiritual experience – both his own and that of many other monks, anchorites on Mount Athos, who through fasting, solitude, and prayer overcame their passions and vices, thereby uncovering the path of Divine knowledge and becoming so imbued with the power of the Divine presence in their lives that it rested upon them visibly. Very many of these solitary Elders and ascetics indeed shone with light, as if repeating that which took place on Mount Tabor. This amazing spiritual phenomenon and struggle called Hesychasm is remembered during Great Lent to helps us understand the meaning and fruit of fasting and prayer.

Confession and the Forgiveness of Sins

Jesus Christ spoke twice of the Mystery (Sacrament) of Repentance. The first time He said to the Apostle Peter that He will give him the keys of the kingdom of heaven so that whatever he will bind on earth will be bound in heaven and whatever he will loose on earth will be loosed in heaven (Matthew 16:19). Sometime later He gave the authority to forgive and to retain sins to all the apostles. This was done in conjunction with their task to resolve problems among the members of the Church: "Assuredly, I say to you, whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven" (Matthew 18:15-18). The Lord solemnly established the Sacrament of Confession soon after His Resurrection. He appeared to His disciples and said to them, "Peace unto you! As the Father has sent Me, I also send you.' And when He had said this, He breathed on them and said: `Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained'" (John 20:21-23). The apostles transmitted this responsibility to absolve and to retain sins to their disciples bishops and priests — who were to continue their task of saving human souls. However, the priest-confessor does not absolve sins by his own power, and there is nothing mechanical in the prayers of absolution. The priest-confessor is a witness of one's repentance and a mediator of Divine Grace. God appointed him to be an instrument of His mercy. Ultimately it is up to the repentant to make his soul receptive to the healing Grace. What is crucial here is to have sincere regret for committed sins and to decide to become a better Christian. Our Lord Jesus Christ said, "I did not come to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance" (Matthew 9:13). Confession is a mystery of the Church that confers grace, there is power within it, Divine power. When the priest lays his hand upon our head in Confession, it is Christ who lays his hand upon us, Christ who forgives and that is certainly the deepest and most profound reason why we should go to Confession. When such grace and healing is offered to us, why would we refuse to accept such an opportunity. **Prayer:** O Father, Lord of heaven and earth, I confess to Thee all the hidden and manifest sins of my heart and mind, which I have committed to this day. Therefore I beseech Thee, the righteous and compassionate Judge, grant me forgiveness and grace to sin no more.
