

Zephaniah, (Sophonias) remembered today, flourished in the 7th century BC. An Israelite prophet, the author of one of the shorter Old Testament prophetical books, who proclaimed the approaching divine judgment. The prophet's activity occurred during the early part of Josiah's reign. He criticized the worship of certain gods in Jerusalem (Baal, Milcom) before Josiah's reform, which took place about 621 BC. Zephaniah is the son of Cushi, and great-great grandson of King Hezekiah, ninth in the literary order of the Twelve Minor Prophets. He prophesied in the days of Josiah, ruler of the Kingdom of Judah (640–609 BC), and was contemporary with Jeremiah, with whom he had much in common. The scene of his activity was the city of Jerusalem, which he knows well. Like the writings of many of the prophets, the book of Zephaniah follows a pattern of judgment on all people for their sin followed by the restoration of God's chosen people. Zephaniah's primary target for God's message of judgment, the nation of Judah, had fallen into grievous sin under the reign of their king, Manasseh. Zephaniah's prophecy shouted out for godliness and purity in a nation sinful to its core. The people of Judah had long since turned their backs on God, not only in their personal lives but also in their worship. This reflected the depth of their sin and the deep need for God's people to be purged on their path to restoration. As a young man, the prophet-to-be would have been surrounded by the trappings of idolatry, child sacrifice, and unjust killings-strong influences on a young mind (2 Kings 21:16; 2 Chronicles 33:1-10). But Zephaniah grew into a man of God, able to stand before the people and proclaim God's message of judgment and hope to a people that had gone astray. This book mentions "the Day of the Lord" more than does any other book in the Old Testament, clarifying the picture of Judah's fall to Babylon and the eventual judgment and restoration of all humanity in the future. Zephaniah saw in "the Day of the Lord" the destruction of his country, his neighbors, and eventually the whole earth (Zephaniah 1:2, 4; 2:10). Zephaniah wrote that the Day of the Lord was near (1:14), that it would be a time of wrath (1:15), that it would come as judgment on sin (1:17), and that ultimately it would result in the blessing of God's presence among His people (3:17).

The **Daily Cycle of Worship** includes Vespers, Compline, Nocturnes, Matins, & Hours. **VESPERS:** The first service of the day begins with the setting of the sun at Vespers. The Vespers service begins with Psalm 104:19-20 worshipping God as Creator: "He appointed the moon for seasons; the sun knows its going down. You make darkness, and it is night". And then Psalm 141 leads us to ask Christ to "Hear our prayer" as we offer "the lifting up of my hands as an evening sacrifice." In the Church at this time of day, as the sun sets, we traditionally give thanks for all the blessings our Lord has granted us this day.

COMPLINE: Prayers for "after dinner" or "as we go to sleep." This prayer is to be read after Vespers and after the evening meal. Compline is made up of Psalms and prayers. Psalm 4 "In Peace I will both lie down and sleep, for You alone, O Lord, make me lie down in safety." Here, we reflect on the difficulties of the day and examine how we handled them and ask forgiveness for our shortcomings as well as our negligence of things we did not do that we should have done.

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NOCTURNS: This Midnight service includes psalms, and the regular prayers of Thrice-Holy, The Lord's Prayer, especially Psalm 119 "At midnight I will rise and praise you." It's mostly known as the "Rush" service that's done just before the Pascha Matins.

MATINS (ORTHROS): Based on Psalm 63, "O God, You are my God, early will I seek You!" At dawn we rise at sunrise and experiencing the goodness of God and praise Him, give thanks, make petitions, and seek His blessing for the activities of the coming day. The Great Doxology to God comes at the end of Matins and the bells ring, calling and announcing to everyone that the Divine Liturgy is about to begin.

HOURS: In addition, there are the services of the Hours. First, Third, Sixth and Ninth hours usually fall into the daily schedule of 6 and 9 in the morning, noon, and 3 in the afternoon. The Hours correspond with the events of the Lord's passion and the third hour (9 a.m.), corresponds with the coming of the Holy Spirit to the disciples. These are times to stop and pray throughout the day to stay focused and recharge, mostly the Psalms are read during the Hours. On days when there is no Liturgy, the Beatitudes and the Creed are also read after the ninth hour (3 pm). At First Hour, read Psalm 5, "To You I pray, O Lord; in the morning You hear my voice!" and ask God to guard us from everything that could harm us in either body or soul. As our senses are being awakened we ask for spiritual awakening through Jesus Christ who is the "true light who comes into the world." At the Third Hour read Psalm 51 "Take not Your Holy Spirit from me." and this is the hour when the Holy Spirit came down upon the apostles on Pentecost. We give thanks to God for this gift and ask to grow the fruits and graces of the Spirit. We also commemorate the condemnation of Christ by Pilate. And Read Psalm 25, and say the prayer "O Lord, You sent down Your Most Holy Sprit upon Your Apostles at the Third Hour. Take Him not from us, O Good One, but renew Him in us who pray to You." At Sixth Hour read Luke 23:33, 44 "There they crucified Him... It was now about the sixth hour" It is when Pilate released Him to the Jews and they condemned Him and He was nailed to the Cross. We rejoice in the infinite life of God and show our gratitude, for through this event He wrought our salvation. And Read Psalm 54. At the ninth hour...Jesus uttered a loud cry and breathed his last." Mark 15: 34, 37. This is the time that Jesus died on the Cross. It is when he promised His kingdom to the repentant thief. And Read Psalm 84.
